



#### **International Center**








**Resident assistants** (Momoyama's Japanese students) are living in this Dormitory and they will be glad to give you advice about living in Japan.

- \*DO NOT make loud noise late at night. In particular, parties are strictly prohibited in the building.
- \*You must pay the ENTIRE AMOUNT of rent for a semester (JPY240,000) at beginning of each semester. Payment is only acceptable in CASH.
- \*All exchange students will live in the International Student Dormitory. No special procedure is required to move in.
- \*Utilities (Gas, Electricity, and Water) are NOT included in the rent, and tenants must pay the bills on their own.
- \*Internet fee is included in your semester fees.
- \*If you arrive in mid-September or mid-March, a resident assistant can pick you up at Kansai International Airport and you can move into your flat on the first day.
- \*The fees and schedule in this brochure are subject to change.

	In principle, all exchange students have to join Japanese National Health Insurance
	after arriving in Japan.
	With the Japanese National Health Insurance, 70% of medical costs are covered.
	At the same time, we require all exchange students to purchase Momoyama
	Inbound insurance (see below), that works alongside the mandatory National Health
	Insurance to provide 100% coverage*.
	Please note that without this additional insurance policy, students CANNOT register


- Pre-lectures and project-based learning during the semester (Scheduled to start in May)
